Write a pirate themed story. You may wish to use <i>Treasure Island</i> by Robert Louis Stevenson as inspiration.  Aim to include:  o Literary devices such as onomatopoeia, alliteration, personification, metaphors, similes, pathetic fallacy  o Expanded noun phrases  o A variety of simple, compound and complex sentences. o Adventurous vocabulary choices o Paragraphing	Research different measurements from a famous Shipwreck. Create your own mathematical word problems using these measurements.  O Try to include multi- step problems. O Use different operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division) O Include questions that require converting between units of measurement O Don't forget to write your units of measurement!	You may have noticed that at school, we have had some solar panels installed recently! Find out about how solar panels work. Create an explanation / labelled diagram of how they are used.  Can you find out o Are solar panels used in objects other than buildings? o How do solar panels create energy? o How much energy do they generate?	Create a 3D model of a famous shipwreck from around the world. You may wish to show it as a shipwreck, or how it looked originally. (Not the Titanic)  O Draw a sketch showing the proportions of your design. O On your sketch, label the parts of the ship. O Challenge: can you proportionally scale down your version of the ship with the original?	Research a famous shipwreck from somewhere around the world (not The Titanic!) and write a non-chronological report about it.  o Identify on a map the location and direction of its last voyage. o Write your report in paragraphs with different subheadings. o Try to include fronted adverbials and relative clauses.
Write a set of instructions on how to capture Blackbeard.  o Research who Blackbeard was and why people wanted to capture him. o Include: an introduction, a list of what is needed, a method, top tips, a diagram o Use some adverbials of time at the start of your sentences.	Create a set of ship/pirate themed top trump cards. You may wish to base this on particular famous people related to ships/shipwrecks or famous ships themselves.  O Think carefully about the categories you will choose. O Can you include measurements (of mass and/or length) within your top trumps?	Go on an electrical insulator and conductor scavenger hunt around your home. Can you find five objects that would conduct electricity and five objects that would be electrical insulators?  O Write an explanation showing the difference between electrical conductors and insulators. Think carefully about how you will present the information you find. Can you include photographs or diagrams?	Design or create a pirate's eyepatch, treasure, outfit or other artefact.  o Sketch your design and label it. o Annotate it with which materials you will use for each part. o Think carefully about the embellishments you can use to add finishing touches to your design.	Research a famous shipwreck from somewhere around the world (not The Titanic!) and write a quiz about it (at least 10 questions with answers). Alternatively, you could write your questions about a particular fiction book related to this topic.  o Think of at least 10 questions o Include some questions that allow extended answers. o Will you share a small amount of information first (eg. a quote) and then ask the questions o Will your questions be multiple choice? A combination of different styles?
